Tryouts for Girls Flag Football went extremely well, considering that many of the girls who turned up have been or are involved in other sports or participate in flag football teams outside of school. Due to this being the first year Independence held this sport, nobody was cut from the team during tryouts as Coach Nelson and Coach Baker wanted everyone to be involved without splitting them into JV and Varsity.

"As of now, the first year, we're just one big varsity team. There will be no cuts this year because we want everyone to be a part of this special moment. In the future, there will be a JV team, we just need to find the coaches for it," Coach Nelson commented.

"Definitely the aspect that it's football and it's non-contact. Part of the rules, there's no blocking involved so it makes it hard on the offense to make plays where everything is solely on how good we can throw and catch." Maui Fires Devastate

One of the most devastating wildfires in the US left towns in the island of Maui in ruins. Beginning in early August, the wildfires broke out in Maui, its rapid spread due to hurricane winds and its drought. On August 8th, a large wildfire started in the historic town of Lahaina and within a few days, the town completely burnt down. Videos show footage of residents fleeing the town, the town covered in fire and smoke. Some seeked refuge in the ocean.

"I am sad for the Hawaiian community, there has not been a lot of support from the government," Ms. Roberts, a PE teacher, was born in Hawaii and has family there. However, she is not the only one with family in Hawaii.

"My relatives and family friends living in Maui are the ones being affected the most as a portion of them (the ones living in Lahaina) lost their homes and had to be relocated," stated a student who wishes to remain anonymous.

"My parents often talked to me about Maui, especially Lahaina (where they would often go when they were free) and Wailuku (where I was born). They also knew a lot of the residents there and would often talk about them."



The Aftereffect of the Maui Fires

Lahaina's history dated back hundreds of years, being the capital of the Kingdom of Hawaii from 1820 to 1845. Many historic sites reflected the town's culture, such as the Lahaina Banyan tree planted in 1873, its 150th birthday celebrated in April.

"My parents were planning to take my family over there so I could see my birthplace and visit my relatives and their friends," said the student. "Now, it is unlikely for me to go over there due to those events. Additionally, I will never see some of the sights or people my parents mentioned."

If students and staff at IHS wish to assist in the efforts to help recover Lahaina, the website www.mauinuistrong.info provides further information on relief programs and organizations to provide support to the fire's victims.

"To help, I think the students and staff at IHS can fundraise to support the residents of Maui. From what I heard from my cousins, ACHS (Adolfo Camarillo HIgh School) in Los Angeles has already started fundraising," the student mentioned.

By early September, the fires were 100% contained. It will take years for the town to recover, but according to the website LahainaTown.com, they are not deterred.

"Lahaina town still exists in its people. So long as we can collect ourselves, clean up, and rebuild, Lahaina will never perish."

Are School-wide Lessons Effective?



The design was immediately controversial, with some deeming it visually unappealing while others believed the hate was undeserved.

ASB: Behind The Scenes

Addressing the misconceptions about ASB functions, finances, and participation, ASB finances have been misunderstood throughout the school years, from club taxes to how they regulate their spending. Rumors circulating within Independence High School have set off some uncertainty on ASB and whether their finances are being spent for personal use, if club funding is being misappropriated, or overall finance mismanagement.

Mr. Logan, the activities director at Independence states, "I think there's this misconception about what ASB is. ASB is everybody. So every organization at our school. So athletics, clubs, asset



programs... and any kind of student group is ASB."

🚼 It seems as though students don't necessarily understand how ASB functions, what their purpose is, or even the standards

directed by the district that ASB needs to follow.

"People oftentimes think ASB is in charge of the money – they're not, they're in charge of making sure people spend their money correctly.

"So the district says, 'If you guys want to charge students, you need to spend a minimum of 80% of that money on the students that paid." Mr. Logan adds.

Strictly listening to conspiracies regarding ASB finances doesn't provide much insight into what actually happens behind closed doors and what their money goes towards.

Amy Tran, the ASB vice president of student outreach states, "ASB does a lot of behind-the-scenes work from organizing the schedule for events, to getting contracts signed, to all the work that needs to be done in preparation of the continued on page 6

Many would similarly share these views as this change could make it fair for


everyone to participate in Homecoming Court while having the entire school community be included in such a festive event. However, some others think the change is not as great as it sounds.


"Because we're only separated by grade level... I don't think most people's level of understanding is the same. If you compare a normal year of math class compared to summer school math classes, I

It can be hard to teach students, especially as a math teacher, when everyone is at a different learning level, when some students don't understand the topic, a teacher might have to reteach it even though it was already taught in a past grade level. Because of this it can be difficult to teach all students when everyone is at a different level of understanding. It can be a struggle to remember everything in math, even the

Says Mr. Haworth from room C-305

Courses such as English and History deal with the same issues with curriculum, but it is much easier to deal with, unlike Math. English and History focus more on retaining information and free response than strict answers and showing how you figured it out. Because of this, Math can seem more daunting than other subjects. Even Chemistry can be easier as it

revolves more around puzzling things together. While it does contain math, it's more loosely formed.

Ms. Ko from Room A-405 says, "We have a priority standard... if it is something that is not continuous from Math 1 to all the way to Calculus, if it's a subject that is isolated and not very popular... then I would tend not to teach it, also there's a priority standard—I try to go to the priority standard."

A lot of students don't realize, but Math is a lot more than just 'figuring out the answer.' Teachers in general have to follow state requirements and a specific Math curriculum. As well as this, there is

also a time limit to how long teachers can spend on teaching a subject. Teachers can sometimes find it difficult as well because they all have different standards of what they believe is more important in the material they teach. Rein Gallagher states, "I wouldn't change anything, I think the menu is pretty assorted, there's like a lot of options."






Photo of Independence's Stadium
