Confusion Over Counseling

Complaints swirl, but students have misconceptions about counselors' jobs

Counselors at Independence have received some criticism over the years from frustrated students, but at the same time, counselors have to deal with multiple factors when helping students with their schedules that few, if any, students really understand or know about.

Students have complained about not getting the class they want, not being allowed to drop out of a class that is affecting their mental health, or not being able to change the time they start their classes.

Senior Nandine Vasudeva said, "In my freshman year, I wanted to have art class but I got put into drama instead, even when I never requested that class. When I tried to switch, my counselor refused and said it was better for me to take the class in my senior year. Basically, I had to deal with this class and wait a few years to actually take the class I wanted."

Senior Jericho Reyes said, "My bad experience was when I tried to change my schedule from a late schedule to early schedule. We had a one-on-one which she [the counselor] stated that I couldn't change my schedule and that it was too late (September). I explained to her that I would have no one to drop me off to school and she stated that it was too late to change my schedule. Now I am struggling just going to school because she cared more about there being no room then someone who is being very transparent and telling her my struggle."

And while those complaints and

opinions are valid, there are external circumstances and hard work that goes behind the counseling process that prevents students from getting what they want.

Ms. Huynh says, "There are factors students do not consider, in which a School Counselor must consider; for example, for every new student added to a class more unnecessary work and stress is added onto a teacher to help the student play catch up. A class could have extra desks, but doesn't mean there is availability as each class is capped at a maximum number. What students also don't think about is that if there is availability, we need to save space for the 200 students who on average enroll throughout the school year."

"It is more than just giving students the classes that they want. As counselors, we of course want to give students the classes that they want and will enjoy taking. Sometimes room just doesn't permit during a specific year and sometimes high school graduation requirements haven't been met; therefore, other necessary classes need to be taken...As counselors, a big part of our job is being the students #1 advocate at school. We do our very best to set up every student for success! But recognize we won't always be able to please everyone." adds Ms. Marquez.

Additionally, Mr. Ly states, "When it comes to mental health, our school counselors are committed to supporting students in a caring and mindful way. We understand that sometimes the underlying issues affecting a student's academic performance are beyond school and may require additional support beyond schedule changes...While grades are an important part of the academic experience, I want our students to see themselves as more than a score but as human beings. Grades aren't the gold-plates indicator of success. Success is more than just grades or test scores."

Lastly, it's important to remember that each counselor has between 400 and 500 students. The counseling team manages a lot of students and effectively addresses the global teacher and staff shortage. If your needs aren't met, it's because there are several other factors involved. We should learn to appreciate our counselors as they have multiple responsibilities. It's not an easy job after all.

However, even if our counselors can't fulfill our requests due to external circumstances, they should at least try to make an effort to listen and offer support rather than rushing to move on to another student. I believe that I can speak for the majority of students when I say that we want to feel that our counselors hear and understand our struggles and concerns. Many students say they don't feel heard when expressing their issues, but maybe now we know what counselors' job responsibilities are, and we can understand while asking counselors to be more aware of student frustrations at the same time.

Taking a Trip to the Cabaret

The Drama department presented its spring musical *Cabaret*.

Shows dates were 3/17, 3/18, 3/24, and 3/25 starting at 7 PM with a 5 PM Matinee on 3/23.

When asked what the play is about, Director of the Drama Department Robin Edwards explained "It is taken from John Vendor's *I am a Camera*, a story of an American Investigating 1930s Germany as the Nazis come into power. He Observes Germany going from a thriving democracy to what will lead to WW2."

Cabaret features multiple plot lines: A young writer gets into a relationship with an English Cabaret Singer; At the same time an older German woman and a Jewish man begin their own romance; All the while several Cabaret Members reflect what had happened.

This play is intended for older teens and adults (with a PG13 advisory); the story is set in a nightclub and Edwards mentioned that it pressed the boundaries of what teenagers could do in a performance.

Edwards said, "[It has some] risque bits to it. Takes place in a nightclub. This is a darker musical, makes you think about the world. "

Despite the spring musicals typically being more lighthearted, there were a few reasons as to why this musical was selected:

The biggest reason for this choice would be what has been going on in Ukraine. Edwards said that Putin's escalating actions had reminded her of this musical that she did back when she was in high school. In addition, Edwards cites modern America as a reason for why she chose this play.

"We [people don't] want to make other[s] uncomfortable," Edwards said. "[But] sometimes you need to speak up even if it is in an uncomfortable situation."

Other reasons were requests by the performers and other members of the musical. One example would be for a call for more musicians getting involved, as modern pits only included 5 or so members. Another example would be a desire for more dancing.

This change in tone does not come without difficulties. Not only for presenting the musical to an audience, but for the actors to get in it as well.

Junior Anthony Beltram, who played Herr Schultz, commented "[My Biggest Challenge was] trying to get into it. It seems okay, it was hard for me to grasp my attention, dealing with some of the topics at hand."

"The hard part for me was the darker topics in this. A lot of times, we as people want to suppress what happens. And bringing this to light can be sensitive to a lot of people. I didn't want to do something that may hurt other people." said Sophomore Jayda Reyes, who played one of the Kitkat Dancers Lulu.

Regardless of how the play was perceived, it did succeed in leaving an important question "what happens to these characters?"

"Last Saturday, I went to see the Cabaret productions with my friends. Going in, we were expecting a lighthearted story with pretty lights and red sparkly dresses...but instead we left the theater thinking over the events of the show," said Sophomore Brianna Choy. "[A] part I enjoyed was the second time "Willkommen" was performed. It was almost like propaganda trying to will us into believing the cabaret and life was perfect but it was interrupted by the disappearing orchestra. The ending felt a bit sudden and it was subtle."

The Water Walk, an event where students load water on their backs and learn about water conservation, was held for the second year in a row by Solar Suitcase and Mr. Stone.

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When asked why water walk was conceived, Mr. Stone said "In 2017, I visited Kenya, Africa with 2 solar suitcase members. One of the activities we did was visit a nearby village and we carried water in buckets in a stream...The ladies do it 4-5 times a way. Here where you can get as much water as you want, it made an impression on us what people had to do...we wanted to show that experience back to Independence."

Along the track there were panels showing information about water consumption and conservation, students would then be quizzed on said information after they completed the course. Winners of the track will be decided by two metrics: (1) How fast one completes the track (2) How well one does on the quizzes; the latter will be weighed more.

When asked about how cheating will be addressed, Mr. Stone said "Instead of any kind of electronic submission we will have paper submissions. We will have proctoring that will disable electronics. We realized that was a problem so we would amend it."

In addition to the signature trek, the Water Walk also features performances from Mr. Brandt, Desi Club, Cloud 9, VSA, Chinese Club, and Ukulele Club, as well as activities and a burger grill.

The solar suitcase club cites the lack of people running all of these

additional features of the water walk as their biggest challenge. This year, students will have the opportunity to work at different times instead of all of them working on one shift.

Club Historian Darrell Salinas mentioned "The Water Walk's greatest challenge was our club size. We are such a small group trying to make a school-wide event, and getting more people to help has been the main struggle."

The money raised by Water Walk will be used to buy Solar Suitcases for next year.

"[It is] a portable ruggedized solar system that is meant to be deployed in developing countries..." said Mr. Stone "...such as Kenya, Uganda, and the Philippines. 2 in Inde as an emergency, and some in the Native Reservations."



Are we the school where we allow sexual harassment to be broadcast to the students and staff who are required to attend?

Maybe it is, but I hope we can be better.

At the Wrap It Up Rally, one of the student clubs that performed began their dance performance with a voice-over stating loudly: "If you don't like this you can suck my _____". The four-letter word that concludes this phrase was omitted, however I believe that everyone who heard it knew what the missing word was. To be clear, this was not a passing lyric in a song but spoken statement that preceded the beginning of the dance and set the tone for the rest of the performance.

I believe this was completely inappropriate and unacceptable. While I think that the use of the implied profanity was inappropriate, that is not at the heart of my complaint.

This phrase is in several ways not OK for most if not all presentations, and certainly not at a High School Rally, especially one supposedly celebrating the "Sixer Values" of Spirited, Innovative, eXtraordinary, Engaged and Respectful. Words matter. This phrase is an extremely hostile and provocative statement intended, in almost any context, to demean and humiliate the recipient. Used interpersonally, it is likely to precipitate highly aggressive reactions. Someone who says this to another person should reasonably expect at best a verbally offensive, or a physically violent reaction. These are fighting words. It is also sexually explicit comment that creates a hostile environment. This is one of the textbook definitions of sexual harassment.

If we allow student groups to present this kind of message at a school wide event, without accountability, we are admitting that this type of speech and behavior is acceptable on our campus.

Is this who we are? Is this who we want to be?

The Glory Review

Some elements of the series are based on real-life events that took place in South Korea. The Glory has had a global impact, reaching the top of Netflix's viewing ranking for non-English TV shows. It has also sparked public conversations and apologies from public figures for past bullying behaviors, such as Pawat Chittsawangdee, a Thai actor.

The Glory has real life facts and events that happen like how the series

does not let the viewers forget about the horrific physical bullying that the protagonist endured as a child; the bodily scars are repeatedly shown on screen. But for the protagonist, just as painful are the long-lasting emotional scars. Studies have shown that bullied children experience emotional distress that can carry on into adulthood.

Senior Derrick Domingo gives his thoughts about The Glory saying: " I like how the show relates to real life events like bullying and how other people deal with it growing up"

The series ends with Dong-eun and Joo Yeo- jeong walking into prison for a day of work and the start of their implied revenge plot. It is a kind of happy ending for Dong-eun, who still gets to do what she has spent her life training herself to do - take revenge - but also has someone by her side. The never show promised realism, but rather promised catharsis for the pain Dong-eun endured as а child and for the anger that came when no one held



her abusers accountable for it. It never promised life for Dong-eun after revenge, but we got that too - as a bonus. Dong-eun writes to the landlord she once saved as a teenager, saying she didn't grow up to be a good person, but one spring, she will fully bloom. It is the promise of healing, in the midst of more revenge.


The Mandalorian Season 3-Pt.2

Senior Ivan Esquival, a first sprinter, had this to say about track: "The community is really nice...we have meets every week and I look forward to them. I do well on the track meets... The coach is like he has the capability to be a college coach, that is why our track team does really well."

Esquival added, "Track is cool because anyone can be on track. As
